MMW NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED FOR EXCELLENCE

Minnetonka Middle School West (MMW) has been recognized as a 2021 National Blue Ribbon School. It is one of 325 schools nationwide and one of just six in Minnesota to earn this prestigious distinction. The recognition is based on a school's overall academic performance or progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups.

"Earning the National Blue Ribbon School distinction truly exemplifies the dedication, persistence and an ever-present pursuit of excellence," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Dennis Peterson. "I congratulate the current principal of Minnetonka Middle School West, Freya Schirmacher; the past principal, Dr. Paula Hoff, and all of the teachers and staff at the school who made this accomplishment possible."

The National Blue Ribbon School award affirms the hard work of educators, families and communities in creating a safe and welcoming school where students master challenging and engaging content. MMW has been recognized as an Exemplary Achievement Gap-Closing School for being among Minnesota's highest performing schools in closing achievement gaps between a school's student groups and all students.

"This award is a true reflection of the small moments of excellence that happen every day at MMW; a student who takes a risk to ask a question, a teacher who works a little bit longer so that a student understands a concept and a family member who partners with a teacher to design a plan for learning.
