Office of Admissions

- Colleges seek the best students they can find/attract/admit/enroll for their entering class
- Students seek the best college they can attend
- Everyone is aware of rankings, prestige, fame – nobody wants to miss out!
- Numbers are important – not just in terms of applications, but in terms of a student's academic record. And some colleges got a lot of application last year!
- It's a process, with lots of steps/stages. Patience is a value-added virtue!

Office of Admissions – Changes from COVID-19

- Most colleges have adopted a test-optional policy in admission – the exceptions are primarily public universities in the Southeast. The updated list can be found at FairTest.org
<http://fairtest.org/university/optional>
- It remains “to be determined” about testing policies for the Class of 2024, but the movement in admissions fully supports test-optional policies
- The optional writing section in the SAT has been eliminated. The SAT Subject Tests have been eliminated. The number of colleges requiring an ACT test with writing is less than five – students don’t need to do the optional writing section of the ACT.
- Most colleges and universities require registration for a campus tour. Many have added significantly to their YouTube campus tour productions. It’s important to check a college’s “visit” website before scheduling a trip!

Holistic review – what's most important?

- The high school transcript – the student's record of academic achievement – is the most important part of the application folder.
- The rigor of the courses you have taken, the breadth of study within each department, and the grades you have earned will be examined in detail. The transcript speaks loudly.
- Colleges and universities want to see the quality of your life as a student. They want to see trends, growth, challenge, and achievement.

Testing – For those who choose to test

- Juniors are encouraged to wait until 2023 to test -- with more time for instruction and learning, and (for those who choose to do it) test preparation.
- Oct 1 SAT
- Oct 12 PSAT (for juniors)
- Oct 22 ACT
- Nov 5 SAT
- Dec 3 SAT
- Dec 10 ACT
- Feb 11 ACT
- Mar 7 ACT – school day test for juniors

- How do you learn best?

Self inventory (cont.)

- Do you enjoy being a part of a large group? Or do smaller groups suit you better?
- Do you want to stick close to home? Or do you plan to move far away?
- Do you want to live in or near a city? Or could you find happiness in a college town?
- Do you seek out diversity among your friends? Or do you hang out with people who are very similar to you?

- Faculty/Student Ratio
- Major/Strongest programs/Courses offered
- Geographical location and distance from family
- Learning focus- Liberal Arts or Specialized School
- Urban/rural

- Graduation rate



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

Applying for admission – it happens in the senior year!

- For all our students, let this be your “guide.” You apply for admission to a college because you want to go there!
- Focus as much on “going” to the college as you will focus on “getting in.”
- As a counseling staff, we plan to work with students in the college search process to help them find good matches!!

Applying for admission (continued)

- As you get ready to become an applicant, your top priority is finding the right fit! NOTE: You apply for admission to a college because you want to go there!
- Most MHS seniors apply between August and December
- Separate deadline for need-based financial aid -- filing the FAFSA can be done after October 1. www.fafsa.ed.gov
- Determine which application plan/option works best for you (Early Decision, Early Action, Regular Decision or Rolling)
- The selection process can last for months, especially when cost of attendance is a significant factor.

Applying for admission – next steps

- Attend the in-person and virtual college admission visits this fall – see Naviance for the full list (in the Colleges tab)
- MEA week travel – seniors have off that Wednesday!
- Arrange a meeting with your school counselor or college counselor
- Fill out the Transcript Release form
