Celebrating Success with the Class of 2016

Minnetonka High School seniors tossed caps Thursday, June 9, in a final display of enthusiasm for which the class was so well known. The following accomplishments only begin to capture the success of these 702 graduates.

ACADEMICS: PREPARED FOR LIFE AFTER MINNETONKA

The Class of 2016 posted an average ACT score of 26.7, the second-highest in Minnetonka history. Four students earned an ACT score of 36, the highest possible. Always reaching higher, 79 percent of this class enrolled in one or more Advanced Placement (AP) or International Baccalaureate (IB) courses during their high school career. Twenty-five students pursued the full IB diploma. Like alumni before them, Minnetonka graduates are prepared for college and career: 91 percent are enrolling in two- or four-year colleges, 16 have enlisted to serve our country, still others are choosing a gap year to explore other cultures or interests.

ARTS: WORTHY OF STATE & NATIONAL RECOGNITION

Seniors turned in exceptional performances to help Minnetonka Theatre earn 36 Spotlight Awards for "Nice Work if You Can Get It" and "Pippin"—including Outstanding Overall Production. Leo Plante (and junior Christine Hwang) won Spotlight's Triple Threat Awards. The Competition One Act play, "Third," earned the state's highest honors with a Starred Performance. Eleven seniors were honored with Scholastic Art Awards; one earned a National Gold Medal. Seniors represented us well in all-state band, choir and jazz band; 13 musicians delivered superior performances in state band and orchestra solo/ensemble competitions.

ACTIVITIES: DEFINED BY EFFORTS BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

From DECA internationals to Math Team, Science Olympiad to Physics Bowl, seniors took their interests to a competitive level, delivering leadership, outstanding results and Tonka Pride.

ATHLETICS: CHARACTERIZED BY CAMARADERIE AND SPIRIT

Thirty-three athletes signed letters of commitment to compete at the college level. Girls basketball, boys tennis and boys golf brought home state championships. Boys swim and dive were the True Team State Champions and earned second place at state. Girls swim and dive won the True Team State Title and the Section 2AA meet. For the second year in a row, boys soccer won the Section 2AA title. The Sailing Club competed in a national regatta. For the first time in program history, the wrestling team, led by seven seniors, qualified for the team state tournament.

As freshmen, the Class of 2016 chose "Adopt a Community" as their legacy service project. Forty-one seniors earned President's Volunteer Service Awards in 2015. Five seniors received a President's Volunteer Service Award all four years. 25 seniors earned Varsity Letters in community service. Heart Week raised \$40,500 for Minnetonka Family Friends, an all-time record.

These students and their classmates in other classes have won several conference, section and state championships in athletics and they have won numerous awards in drama and music. They have been leaders in many ways and are prepared to be leaders in the future.

The School Board has adopted the 2017 Budget, and it probably represents the strongest financial condition in the District's history.
